PROMOTION

1. Select Day Camp and Webelos Adventure Camp chair or coordinator.
2. Select desired camping dates.
3. Promote at December and January Pack meeting using promotional DVD, Leaders' Guide books, Scout flyers, and promotional packet.
4. If you need assistance contact your district's camp promotion chair or your local Scout Service Center.
5. Make reservations with a \$15 **(non-refundable)** deposit per Scout starting Jan. 2. Remember reservations are on a first come basis. Sessions will be closed when all sites have been reserved. **Remember sessions fill quickly.**

***Reservation and overnight fees are non refundable and cannot be applied to final fee balance.**

Non-refundable fees may be transferred to another Scout if a paid Scout is unable to attend.

Camp Belzer Friday family overnight is \$7 per person. District Day Camp Friday family overnight is \$5 per family. **Family Overnight registration is paid for during your week at camp.**

District Day Camps are staffed by volunteers which lowers the Scout's attendance fee. If a parent or leader serves on a District Camp staff, their son attends free. Please see the camp director or business manager for an application or call (317) 813-7125 or toll free 1-877-925-1900 to request a staff application before June 1st.

When paying final fees, please include:

- Completed Roster (form B-44)
- Completed Class A and B Health Forms (for every Scout registered to attend camp)
- Completed Workership Applications (form B-50)
- Final fees and forms are due at least 2 weeks prior to your scheduled camp date. Remember to deduct your \$15 reservation fee when calculating your balance due.

Early bird fees are due by April 12 or sooner.

(Any payment received after April 12 is regular fee at \$10 more per Scout.)

WORKERSHIP PROGRAM

The Workership program assists Scouts in need attend camp. This program encourages Scouts to complete age appropriate service hours in exchange for up to 50% of their early bird camp fee. Verification of service hours completion will be done. The council holds a "Cookout on the Circle" to raise funds for Scouts in need. Applications are available in your camp packet or at a Scout Service Center (see pg 13). Application must be submitted by April 12th.

REFUND POLICY

Camp fees are partially refundable in case of non controllable hardship, e.g. illness, family death, summer school (ISTEP), custody issues.

- Hardships do not include family vacation, sports, etc.
- Refund request forms must be completed by leaders or parents prior to the completion of your planned camping week. The form is to be given to the camp business manager.
- **Refunds are processed when summer camp is over.**

No refunds will be processed prior to camp.

RESERVATION AND OVERNIGHT FEES ARE NON REFUNDABLE.

If there is a disagreement with a refund, the unit leader or parent shall advise the District Outdoor Program Chairman.

WHO CAN ATTEND DAY CAMP?

Cub Scout Day Camp is open to all BSA registered Tiger Cubs, Cub Scouts, Webelos I and II Scouts. Webelos are welcome at Day Camp, and are also encouraged to attend Webelos Adventure Camp at Kikthawenund Scout Camp. **Webelos may attend both camps.** Camp Belzer offers a 1st year Webelos program where Scouts can earn the Webelos Camper Award and a 2nd year Webelos program where Scouts can earn the Firelight award. These programs include setting up a campsite, cooking, tomahawks, and more.

The 1st year Webelos Camper program is offered on a limited basis at District Day Camps. Check with your camp director to see if the program is available.

TAG-A-LONGS

Tag-a-longs are the non-Cub Scout children of the adult leaders in camp and are welcome to attend with their parent or legal guardian.

(No neighbors, friends, children being babysat, can be considered tag-a-longs)

Requirements:

- Completed A & B health form on file at camp
- Paid the daily fee (\$10 at Belzer Day Camp)
- Paid the daily fee (\$7 at District Day Camps)
- Accompanied by a legal parent or guardian

RESTRICTIONS INCLUDE:

- BBs
- ARCHERY
- CANOE RAFTING

A BSA registered Scout tag-a-long attending Camp Belzer for the day may participate in all activities, with no restrictions, provided they pay 1/5 of the regular camp fee (\$23 per day in 2013) and their tag-a-long bracelet is marked accordingly.

Accident insurance for tag-a-longs **must** be provided by the parents. Tag-a-longs are not covered by Scout insurance.

DEN CHIEFS

Packs are invited to bring a Den Chief as a pack helper. He must be a registered Boy Scout who has taken Den Chief Training. A Den Chief will be

permitted to participate in limited activities providing he has paid the \$10 daily tag-a-long fee at Belzer Day Camp or \$7 fee at District Day Camps. A Class A & B Annual Health and Medical Record is due for each Den Chief. Fees and forms are collected daily at camp. A Den Chief cannot be considered as one of your required adult leaders.

RESTRICTIONS INCLUDE:

- BBs
- Archery
- Canoe Rafting will only be allowed when the Den Chief is needed as a pack helper.

March -Hold a parents' meeting to answer any questions and give details. Camp leaders are selected and transportation arrangements are made. Recruit parents for daily camp leadership.

April 12 (or sooner) -**FULL FEE BALANCE DUE payable at a Council Service Center plus:**

- Completed class A & B health forms on all registered Scouts attending
- Copies of insurance cards
- Completed pack rosters
- Completed Workship applications

KEEP COPIES OF ALL PAPERWORK.

Fees and paperwork can be taken care of anytime prior to April 12. All payments made after the April 12 deadline no longer qualify for the \$10 early bird discount.

WHY CUB SCOUT SUMMER CAMP?

FUN! FUN! FUN!

The outdoor program is one of the biggest features about Scouting that appeals to boys. A week at camp is the pinnacle experience your boys will remember about Cub Scouting.

Consider the following:

The program facilities and equipment cannot be duplicated by a unit on its own. Our camps provide a variety of programs and facilities to match your unit's needs.

Advancement opportunities are second to none. Cub Scouts will make great progress on achievements and arrow points.

The enthusiastic, well-trained staff is available to help your dens with a program, whether for fun or training.

Strict health and safety standards are maintained at all times: emergency facilities are available.

National camp standards: Our camps are inspected and follow strict guidelines as required by the National Office of Boy Scouts of America. We pass all standards. Also the National Summertime Pack award will be easier to earn.

ADVANCEMENT

Achievements, activity badges, electives, sports, and academic belt loops and pins may be completely or partially covered at camp. A certificate showing the types of activities covered at camp will be presented to Cub Scouts to discuss with parents or leaders so they may sign off their books.

ACTIVITIES

Activities will vary some at each camp location. All camps make crafts, shoot BBs, and archery.

Not all camps will have swimming. Belzer and Kikthawenund have pools. Pathfinder will swim in the Johnson County Park Lake. Rotary will swim at Crawfordsville High School and bus transportation is provided for offsite swimming.

Rafting is available at Belzer, Bear Creek, Pathfinder, and Kikthawenund.

Games and other Scouting activities will vary at each location.

STAYING OVERNIGHT

A camper may only stay overnight on Friday with a parent, legal guardian, or other related adult age 21 or over. National Standards and Youth Protection Guidelines rule that **NO CUB SCOUT MAY STAY IN A TENT WITH A NON-RELATED ADULT.**

Camp Belzer: All overnight reservations and fees are taken care of at camp. Families may use their own tent or a council provided tent. Reservation deadline for a council provided tent is 2 p.m. Thursday. All other overnights must supply their own tent. Family overnight includes a night swim, s'mores, and more, plus Saturday morning breakfast.

District Day Camps: Friday family overnight reservations and fees are to be taken care of at camp. All overnights must provide their own tent.

FAMILY PICNIC

Make sure your pack families know about the family picnic on Friday evening from 6:15 to 7:35 p.m. At 7:35 p.m. the big campfire starts and by 8:30 p.m., everyone but those staying overnight are on their way home. Make sure parents know how to get to day camp. Families furnish their own picnic meal or hot food may be purchased at Belzer, Pathfinder, and Red Wing Day Camp. Firecrafter, a local camper service organization, offers a hot meal with table service for a nominal fee.

OPENING CEREMONY-LEADER BRIEFING

- Assemble for leader briefing at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, at 8:45 a.m. Tuesday through Thursday, and at 12:45 p.m. on Friday.

-District Day Camp times vary.

All pack leadership and parents present for the day are expected to attend this meeting.

- The camp director will review the daily program with unit leaders while the staff watches the Cub Scouts.
- **EVERY camp leader, parent, tag-a-long and Den Chief must complete a Class A & B Annual Health and Medical Record form and turn it in at camp.**
- Time is allotted for leaders to ask questions or voice concerns directly of the camp director or program director.

FIELD SPORTS

The BB gun and archery ranges are for use only by registered day campers under the supervision of a qualified range officer. BB guns and bows with arrows are provided free of charge at the ranges, so should not be brought from home. Tag-a-longs and Den Chiefs cannot participate in the Field Sports program. **A BSA registered Scout tag-a-long may pay 1/5th of the regular weekly fee per day (\$23 per day in 2013) and will not be restricted from archery and BBs.**

WATERFRONT AREA

SWIMMING is always one of the most popular sports in camp.

Levels

-Non-swimmers – cannot complete the beginner's test.

-Beginners –jump into water, swim 50 feet well

-Swimmers –Swim 75 quality yards freestyle, 25 yards of backstroke, and 30 float on back

Note: Swimming is not available at all Day Camp sites, and bus transportation is provided at Rotary as swimming is off site. Please plan accordingly.

RAFTING is provided by bolting two aluminum canoes together for safety. All participants are required to wear provided life vests and participation is limited to registered day campers and adults. All water activities are supervised by qualified lifeguards. Tag-a-longs may not raft. Den Chiefs may only raft when their assistance is needed as a pack helper. **A BSA registered Scout tag-a-long may pay 1/5th of the regular weekly fee per day (\$23 per day in 2013) and will not be restricted from rafting.** Their tag-a-long bracelet is marked accordingly.

FIRECRAFTER

Firecrafter is an honor Scout camping organization based on the ideals of friendship, leadership, and service. Firecrafter has established ranks for Webelos at day camp. The awards are WEBELOS CAMPER (1st year) and FIRELIGHT (2nd year-Belzer Day Camp only)

Requirements for each award may be completed by Webelos as a normal part of the camp program. Patches for these awards are available through the trading post at participating District Camps or during the Friday leaders' check-in at Belzer for \$2.00 each. One pack leader for the entire pack should be responsible for purchasing the patches. Webelos recognition will be conducted at the closing campfire each week.

TRADING POST

The Trail's End Trading Post has ice cream, candy, water and other treats available for purchase. Day camp T-shirts and an assortment of camp souvenirs will be available for purchase by the Cub Scouts and leaders. The trading post is open each day. Soft drink machines are available at Belzer.

A DVD of your week at Camp Belzer can be purchased at leader check-in or in the Camp Office at Camp Belzer on Friday. DVD pre-orders by Thursday are appreciated.

Camp Belzer has youth and adult Belzer sweatshirts, tee shirts, hats, visors, commemorative coins, lanyards, and messenger bags available.

Camp T-shirts may be pre-ordered for personalized T-shirts - See prepayment order form in promotion kit given to each Pack.

PACK OR DEN LEADERSHIP

A teacher, a listener, a motivator, a disciplinarian, these are just a few roles of a leader. Though a leaders' role in camp is probably the most challenging, it is also the most rewarding. Mature, responsible adults are a must. Sources of leadership include: regular den leaders, assistant den leaders, mothers and fathers, grandparents, or your sponsoring institution. Remember, your adult leadership attends at no charge.

One adult attending camp must currently be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America (over 21 years of age) and all other adults must be at least 18 years of age. **Every pack is required to have at least two adult leaders in camp at all times.**

Additionally a ratio of one adult for every ten or portion of ten Scouts (1:10) must be maintained (see table). Adult leaders are expected to participate in the daily leaders' meeting. Leadership is to be provided for each Cub or Webelos group you bring to camp. Webelos I and Webelos II will be split at Camp Belzer. Small packs may share leadership. Ask about this option if needed.

ADULT PROGRAM & LEADERSHIP EVALUATIONS

We welcome daily suggestions to improve your camp experience. Evaluation forms are available at camp. It is important to us you complete the form and turn it in to the camp director, camp office, or put in one of the mailboxes provided. We need to know what unit adults

and leaders are thinking, what we are doing right, what you and the boys like, what you do not like, and what you would like to see changed. We strongly encourage you to complete an evaluation! Camp directors also welcome the chance to talk with you.

TRANSPORTATION

- Most packs either car pool or use buses. It is imperative that national standards be observed.
- All drivers must have a valid operator's license and be at least 18 years of age.
- Seat belts must be provided and used by all passengers and the driver. School and commercial buses are exempt.
- Trucks, trailers, and campers shall not be used to transport Cub Scouts and leaders except in the cab.
- Drivers shall operate vehicles at a reasonable speed and in accordance with state and local laws.
- All vehicles must be covered by a public liability and property damage insurance policy as follows:
Passenger car, station wagon, or car – public liability: \$50,000 each person, \$100,000 each accident; property damage: \$50,000 (minimum Indiana requirements)
- Van, RV and passenger bus (noncommercial vehicle which carries 10 or more passengers) – public liability: \$100,000 each person, \$500,000 each accident; property damage: \$100,000.

HEALTH LODGE AND MEDICAL SERVICES

The health lodge has a qualified health officer who is in communication with the camp physician for any

emergency. Minor injuries are handled by the health officer. If the injury is serious, the camper or leader is taken to the emergency room at the local hospital. An adult from your unit should accompany the person going to the hospital.

ALL INJURIES and INCIDENTS (no matter how minor) MUST BE REPORTED TO THE HEALTH OFFICER TO ENSURE PROPER DOCUMENTATION AND TREATMENT.

IMPORTANT: Indiana law requires all medications be turned in to the health officer so the camp can control and dispense them. The medication should be in its original container which should indicate the Scout's name, pack number, parent's phone number, and dosage instructions.

CLASS A & B ANNUAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RECORDS

EVERY Cub Scout, Webelos Scout, tag-a-long, and adult is required to turn in a completed Class A & B Annual Health and Medical Record – All Blanks Must Be Filled In! **REQUIRED HEALTH FORMS ARE KEPT ON FILE IN THE CAMP HEALTH OFFICE.**

All Scout Health forms, for those attending camp, are due when you make your final payments or no later than two (2) weeks prior to your scheduled camp date. These forms allow our camp health officers to review each Scout's health history prior to his arrival at camp. **Suggestion:** Have parents complete a health form at your pre-camp meeting and return it with the Scout's \$15 reservation fee. Keep pack copies of all forms prior to turning them in at the Council office.

EMERGENCIES

Each camp has specific emergency signals and procedures that are explained the first day of camp. These include instructions for violent weather, heat stress, etc. All campers and all leaders should stay in their area and follow staff instructions.

If a camper or leader needs to leave camp early, they **MUST** sign out in the camp office.

ACCIDENT AND ILLNESS INSURANCE

Each registered Scout and leader is covered by medical insurance for most injuries or illnesses that happen while at camp or in transit to and from the camp. **Campers must be registered members of the BSA to be covered by BSA insurance.** The council provides a secondary insurance policy that each member purchases with \$1 fee at registration. All injuries or illnesses sustained at camp must be filed with the member's primary insurance first. Additional expenses can then be submitted to the Boy Scout policy. This generally covers the usual and customary charges up to \$15,000 per Accident, up to \$7,500 for Sickness, up to \$5,000 for Dental Treatment, up to \$6,000 for Ambulance Service, and up to \$1,500 for Return Transportation Expenses among other benefits. Any expenses beyond these limits are the responsibility of the parent/guardian.

SPECIAL NEEDS

If any of your Cub Scouts or Webelos has special needs, please talk with the camp director about those needs. Please call camp at least 2 weeks prior to

communicate dietary restrictions. Please notify camp if any of your adult leaders have special needs.

UNDERSTANDINGS

- Rules are made for the safety of campers, protection of equipment, and to provide fairness to all.
- All vehicles must be parked in the camp parking lot.
- No fireworks of any kind are permitted in camp.
- No alcoholic beverages are permitted in camp.
- No pets are allowed in camp.
- No fires or open flames are allowed in tents. A “No Flames In Tent” sign must be attached to all personal tents.
- Shoes must be worn in camp at all times.
- Anyone leaving camp early must sign out at the camp office.
- All Packs must have proper adult leadership in camp at all times during your stay.
- Medication is to be brought to the attention of the camp health officer at the time of check-in.
- Aerosol cans containing bug spray, etc. cannot be brought to camp. Please use lotions or pump spray.
- All lanterns are to be used by adults only. All extra fuel must be stored in our fuel storage building.

Discrimination

Acceptance and participation in the camping programs at Camp Belzer and all CAC District Day Camps are the same for everyone without regard to race, color, sex, age, disability or national origin.

- Insect repellent (no aerosol cans)
- Money for trading post

LEADERS BRING

- Completed health history
- Clip board and pen or pencil
- Lunch including drink or purchase a drink
- Lawn chair (needed at District Day Camps only)
- Hat and sunglasses
- Swim suit (one-piece for females)
- Suntan lotion or sun block (no aerosol cans)
- Insect repellent (no aerosol cans)

OVERNIGHTERS

- Swim suit and towel
- Flashlight (extra batteries if needed)
- Personal items
- Sleeping bags
- Tent (if using your own)
- Ground cloth
- Cot or sleeping bag
- Insect repellent (non aerosol), tent mosquito netting

Please do not bring radios, knives or valuables. No aerosol cans are allowed on camp premises.
